





Cogwheel Cancel: Murfreesborough TE


Murfreesborough TE was the second most prolific user of green ink during the 1869 era. Eight surviving covers bear the **cogwheel cancel** of Mufreesborough. One of these covers bears the 1-cent stamp; two bear the two-cent stamp; and five bear the 3-cent stamp. The cogwheel cancel was used for six months from December 30 1869 to June 30 1870.

Owego used both **apple green** and **true green** ink during the 1869 era. In the process this small town produced over half of the surviving fifty or so 1869 covers that bear green cancels.


