When only one copy of a usage is known, it is preceded by an asterisk (\*), and when less than ten copies are known the entry is preceded by two asterisks (\*\*)



## Confederate States of America General Issues

This exhibit contains specimens of all the major varieties of the Confederate General Issue stamps. All stones of the Lithographed series are represented. Also included are many especially significant examples of all issues showing various unique, rare, scarce, and unusual items.

In this exhibit, the Confederate General Issue stamps are presented in order of the printing method used and the earliest recorded date of cancellation.

- \* Denotes only one copy of a usage is recorded.
- \*\* Denotes less than ten copies are recorded.

## The Lithographed Stamps

Lithography is a printing process utilizing a very fine grained block of limestone. There are varying degrees of clarity to these stamps, due not only to the inexperience of the printers helpers and their lack of attention to details, but to inherent defects in the printing process. There are many shades of colors as each batch of printing ink was mixed daily. These varieties occur due to a lack of pigment, different mixing of inks, and ink quality. Lithographed stamps were printed in sheets of two hundred. With the exception of the Ten Cent Blue, Paterson Print, all of the lithographed stamps were printed by Hoyer & Ludwig of Richmond, Virginia.

#### Five Cent Green

This is the first Government - issued adhesive postage stamp of the Confederacy. It is the first stamp to portray the likeness of a living president, Jefferson Davis. There were at least three distinct printing surfaces laid onto the stone during the four month printing period.

# the Typographed Stamps

Early in October 1861, the Confederate Post Office Department sent a representative to England to procure typographed stamps, plates, paper and ink. The London firm of De La Rue & Co. was awarded the contract. The first shipment of a set of plates, paper and ink along with five million of the Five Cent stamps was captured and taken to Philadelphia for destruction but the plates survived. De La Rue prepared another shipment and this one arrived safely. The plates and supplies were turned over to Archer & Daily, Richmond, Virginia to produce additional stamps.


# Five Cent Blue; London Print

Due to the high quality of paper and ink, and the experience of the English printers, these stamps are all clear and distinct with almost no variation in color or texture.



# Five Cent Glue; Kichmond Print

The Five Cent Blue, Richmond Print was printed on a primitive, well worn Washington hand press. Both London paper and an inferior thick coarse paper manufactured in the South were utilized. The locally manufactured inks were also of a much poorer quality. Since the rate change to ten cents took place on July 1, 1862 this stamp is found mostly in pairs to pay that rate.



# the Engraved Stamps

Engravers from the North made their way South to provide the Confederacy with steel plate engraved stamps similar to those used in the Union. They joined with the firm of Archer & Daly to produce these stamps until the end of the war. For a short period of time, towards the end of the war, a few of the plates were taken to Columbia, South Carolina to continue stamp production and keep the plates from being captured. All of these stamps were engraved by John Archer and Frederick Halpin.


The Frame Line stamp was engraved on steel and transferred to a copper plate which was ruled in squares. The stamp was printed in sheets of one hundred. It was printed, delivered and used before the contract was closed. It is literally a "sample stamp".


#### CHATTANOOGA UNDER SIEGE

# Perforated Stampes

In 1862 a perforating device was purchased from England by the Confederacy to be used on its postage stamps. Sheets of the Archer & Daly Ten Cent Blue Type 1 and 2 stamps were used in the trials. The machine proved unsatisfactory and perforating was deemed impractical. Further efforts to perforate stamps were abandoned. The perforations on the test stamps measure 12.5 and range from clean to very ragged. Most stamps are perforated on one to three sides. These are the only perforated stamps officially approved by the Confederate Post Office Department.





## Rouletted

Unofficial, but never the less noteworthy, are those stamps which were privately rouletted to facilitate separation. There were many different methods used to accomplish this and many types exist.

In the fall of 1864, when Richmond, Virginia seemed endangered by the nearness of the Federal armies, the authorities transferred the printing of both stamps and currency to Columbia, South Carolina. There the firm of Keatinge & Ball supplied both items until the city was captured by General Sherman on February 17, 1865. This is the final chapter for the adhesive postage stamps of the Confederate States of America.







