

EARLY RAILWAY MAIL ROUTES OF GEORGIA

The postal histoy of railroad mail lines within the state of Georgia, from the earliest recorded railway markings (1846) until 1889 - a year after complete conversion from route agents to R.P.O.s. Omitted are railroads with a terminal but no miles of track in the state.

Although not railway mail service, carriage of express company messages, especially money letters, began during war and continued after, due to unreliable railway mail.







Route agent service resumed after the Civil War. Perhaps service continued during the war, but known markings and U.S. records indicate interruption.




Main line - Savannah to Jacksonville Route agent, 1868-1872


















"Night" line markings, showing year (above) and train number in dial.


