# Louisiana

#### POSTAL HISTORY

1804 - 1865

A postal history of present-day Louisiana, beginning with initial mail service by the United States and continuing through the Civil War.

The development of the U. S. postal system during the pre-territorial and territorial periods is shown through town markings, rates and postal routes. The later pre-war periods emphasize important town markings, varying rates, use of adhesives, and postal services such as steam, way, express and ocean mails, city and local posts, route agents, auxiliary services and private express mails.

The Civil War period focuses on Independent and Confederate State usages prior to the establishment of the Confederate postal service, followed by CSA stamp usages and markings. Also included are covers showing U. S. occupation mails, as well as private mail services. Examples of efforts to communicate by letter mail between North and South throughout the war are included.

#### "Note-worthy"

Included in the territorial section are the single recorded examples of overseas usages of New Orleans "straightline" and "small circle" cancels. Original research keyed in this section includes United States mail services in Spanish West Florida, especially the "delivered way mail" system developed by the New Orleans post office. Within this area is shown one (of two recorded) postally marked covers delivered within the Republic of West Florida.

Statehood period markings include the only recorded examples of straightline cancellations from Baton Rouge (1813), Harrisonburg (1836), Iberville (1833), Natchitoches (box, 1824), St. Franciscille (1815), and St. Cloud (1851).

Additional "note-worthy" items include the two recorded examples of Mississippi River 1815 "9¢ steamboat" war rate; listing or earliest use examples of other straightline, oval and circle cancellations; single recorded used block of first printing New Orleans Confederate provisional adhesives; printed "30 day return" notice Confederate usage; and earliest civilian mail from New Orleans after occupation.


