### THE LINCOLN MEMORIAL PORTRAIT ISSUES OF 1866-69

During Lincoln's life, American Bank Note Company made an engraved portrait of Lincoln from a late 1861 C.S. German photograph. Reworked by National Bank Note Company, it was the official memorial portrait after Lincoln's assassination. This also became the vignette for the 1866 15 cent black memorial issue, the 1867-68 15 cent grilled issues, the 1869 pictorial issue 10 cent essay and the 1869 90 cent issued stamp.

These selected pages start with newly rediscovered prints of the master dies and trace the essay-proof history of the 15 cent issues, the large die proofs, specimens, trial color, plate proofs and the 1875 reprint. It examines production varieties including grill varieties. Representative cancellations are shown as are color cancels including the very rare green and orange, both on cover.

The exhibit shows postal history of the 15 cent issues starting with the first day of issue in 1866. Domestic usages shown include the 15 cent registry fee period which was during the last six months of this stamp's issuance. Many scarce to rare foreign uses feature large foreign multiple rates and covers to foreign destinations to which only one or a few are known.

The 10 cent 1869 first essay used the memorial portrait, slightly reduced, for stamps and postal stationery. The stamp essays are shown from the first incomplete design through the plate essay on gummed stamped paper. This indicates that the decision to move Lincoln to the 90 cent issue was made late in the essay-proof process. Many experimental safety papers and some stationery essays are shown.

Before the Lincoln vignette was put on the 90 cent 1869, there were proofs and essays with a vignette of George Washington, trial colors of the first frame essay and the revised frame with larger numerals. This project made it to the plate proof stage also.

The 90 cent 1869 with the Lincoln vignette is shown in its hybrid large die proof form, proofs, the issued stamp with and without grill and production varieties showing the different shades, freaks and oddities and a multiple. Also featured are 1875 reprints, one of the two known pairs and some of the 1881 Atlanta trial colors. Since there are no known surviving covers, the exhibit studies cancellations, many of which are the only ones of their type recorded.






Photograph of Lincoln by C.S. German, Jan. 21, 1861, in Springfield, IL adopted as Official Portrait of President

# EVOLUTION OF LINCOLN VIGNETTE Mourning Portrait



This Official Mourning Portrait was re-engraved at the Treasury Department from National's die and issued to the public on February 12, 1866, the 57th anniversary of Lincoln's birth.

The first Lincoln stamp was the 15¢ Black memorial issue shown in this large die proof of the National Bank Note Co. It was based on a late 1861 photograph by C.S.German and its earliest known use is April 14, 1866.



The National Bank Note Company used the die proof to create a few salesmen's sample books showing their products and overprinting information and SPECIMEN in carmine.





### 15¢ BLACK-GRILLS

The grills were embossings on the stamps designed to weaken the paper sufficiently to prevent removal of cancellations and reuse of the used stamps. Three different size grills are known on the 15¢ black stamps issued after Aug. 1867.



The Z Grill has horizontal ridges on the grill points, measures  $11 \times 14$  mm., and three copies are known, one inverted. (The grill is shown here on a 2¢ 1866).

The E Grill has vertical ridges and measures  $11 \times 12$  to 13.5 mm.


Earliest known use of any Lincoln stamp, April 14, 1866, exactly one year after the assassination by John Wilkes Booth, from New York City via Hamburg to Eichelsachsen, Germany (b.s. April 30, 1866).



Earliest recorded use of the E grill, May 2, 1868, from New York City to Paris (b.s. May 11, 1868).



New York City leaf killer used on F Grill on Sept. 22 (1868?) to Paris.



New York City 8 lozanges or diamonds killer used on 15c 1866 on Mar. 14 (1868) to Bordeaux, France.







Foreign markings are often found including the "A" of the Spanish and Portugese "FRANCA" (above left) and the French packet boat "Anchor in a diamond of dots" (above center and right). Both are shown below on the cover from Mareuil-sur-Ay, France, to Lisbon, Portugal (mailed April 28, 1874).






15¢ F-Grills Pale lavender 'Philadelphia, PAID 6, Nov. 6, (1868)'' shows 6¢ credit to France via American packet via England, received at Calais, Nov. 21, 1868. The F killer is believed to stand for 'Foreign''.

15c-1866, smeared impression and double transfer of top and side frame, scarce bright magenta date stamp "Philadelphis, PAID, Dec. 10, 12" (1867), shows 12c credit to France. Arrival stamp (very scarce) blue British packet mark, Dec. 24, 1867, Shippen correspondence.





15c-1866 on folded letter originated in Santiago, Cuba, Jan. 29, 1867, carried outside mails to New York, placed into mails by forwarder. The 'New York, Feb. 23, (1867), PAID 12" shows credit for French transit and orange French packet marking and boxed PD applied same day. Backstamps show receipt in Paris, Mar. 6, in Bordeaux Mar. 7, local delivery Mar. 8, 1867. This orange cancel is the only one known on a 15c Black and believed to be the basis for the erroneous listing as a U.S. cancellation in the Scott U.S. Specialized.

The common domestic usage was to pay the 15¢ registry fee which took effect Jan. 1, 1869. This cover shows that use on a 3¢ 1864 postal stamped envelope from Albany, GA, to Greenville, GA.



15¢ 1866 and 6¢ 1869 used from Portland, ME, to Portage City, WI, Dec. 14 (1869) paid 15¢ registry rate and double weight postage.



15¢ F grill pays registry and 3¢ E grill pays domestic postage from Council Bluffs, IA, May 24, (186?)





But it was treated as short paid, due to being overweight, by the French packet when a black (rather than red) octagonal cancel was struck in New York harbor on Feb. 9, 1867, and it was also stamped "PP" for Partial Payment rather than PD, and rated "16" for 16 decimes due. It is backstamped in Paris, Feb. 21, 1867, on its delivery to the forwarder Hottinguer & Cie. The marking Trouve a la Boite in an octagonal lozenge showed it was marked for forwarding to Rome and dropped in a postbox, stamped in Paris, Feb. 22, 1867, and backstamped on receipt in Rome, Feb. 25, 1867.









The Boston, Sept. 26, (1867), 3¢ credit to France after transit in an American steamship. The United States received 3¢ for inland postage and 9¢ for sea mail.

15¢ F-Grill "Chicago, Ill., Sept. 28, (1868)" and foreign mail red "Chicago, Ill. 6", shows 6¢ credit to France for service on an American packet via England. The letter was received Oct. 13, 1868, and correctly stamped with a boxed PD, but in blue when it should have been in red.

Another double weight cover shown underpaid black "New York Br. Pkt 23, Dec. 25, (1867)" on Christmas Day. The datestamp 23 and the "SHORT PAID" show a rate of 21¢ plus a 2¢ penalty and 5¢ local. Since 15¢ was paid, it was rated 45 pfennige due or 9¢ for a total of 24¢, still 2¢ short.









The National Bank Note Co. prepared many essays for its proposals to the Post Office Department for 1869 Contract bid. On its original proposal, a cropped version of the 15¢ Black of 1866 was used for the 10¢ value, but a different design without Lincoln was adopted in later proposals and Lincoln was shifted to the 90¢ value.




