



DATE ABOVE THE MONTH



Unlike most circle date stamps the date is above the month in the above 34 mm cancel. The postmaster evidently inverted the slugs. This canceling device came into use in the early 1860s.

CORUNNA MISPELLED



A 26 mm circle date stamp with the town name mispelled. This on an 1870-71 issue of the Continental Bank Note Company.

OPERATED MAY 22, 1860 TO OCTOBER 31, 1899

The Blendon Lumber Company owned most of the land in the area and the town was named for them. The post office was established on May 22, 1860 with Milton N. Woodruff as the first postmaster. It ceased operation on October 31, 1899.



UNSEALED CIRCULAR

By act of July 12, 1876, the regulations were changed so that unsealed circulars could be mailed for one cent. By act of March 3, 1879 the law was changed and this now became third class mail. This envelope, unsealed, carried a piece weighing less than two ounces.



The National Bank Note Company print of the one cent Franklin issued in April, 1870 franks this cover. The killer cancel is a "socked on the nose" circle of wedges probably made from a cork. 



TO AND FROM GAYLORD, MICH.




