Essays and Plate proof

This exhibit contains examples of the only essays and plate proof believed to precede or to be contemporary with the stamps and usages which follow. Toppan, Carpenter, Casilear & Co. were awarded the 1851 stamp contract after submitting essays of only one value. The 6¢ essay was a later suggestion. It was changed to 1¢ by need for a lower value due to rate changes of the postal law which was to go into effect from and after June 30, 1851.



Plate One Early

In preparing the first plate, Toppan, Carpenter, Casilear & Co. entered three vertical positions. These were erased and ten top row positions were entered. For more room they burnished lower parts of seven entries and erased two. Position 7R, not touched, was only one to retain full type I characteristics.



After trimming top row positions, engravers, using new transfer roll, finished the top row, re-entering the erased positions i.e., 1 & 2R.

The remainder of plate was completed with trimmed reliefs of new transfer roll. Some entries produced broken lines at top or bottom, now called Type IIIA.

As mentioned, the first three vertical positions were erased. The burnishing was not thorough. Bits of original entries showed through, becoming stronger as the plate wore.














Plate One was reworked about May, 1852. Most positions were re-entered; all but one were recut. An imprint was added. The plate was in service until early 1857.






